Land Acknowledgment

The land of the five boroughs that make up New York City, including the land on which the New York City AIDS Memorial sits, is the traditional homeland of the Lenape, Merrick, Canarsie, Rockaway, Matinecock and Haudenosaunee Peoples. Artist Bios



Troy Anthony is a composer, actor, and director based in NYC. He has presented work at Joe's Pub, 54 Below, Prospect Theater Company, and the Musical Theater Factory (MTF). Commissions include the Atlantic Theater Company, The Civilians, and The Shed. Troy has been seen in the Public Theater's *Twelfth Night* and *As You Like It*, as well as Prospect Theater Company's *Tamar of the River*. He leads the Public Theater's Public Works Community Choir and focuses on the intersection between art and social justice at the DreamYard Art Center. He's also a 2019-2020 MTF Maker.



Andrea Assaf (Playwright, *Eleven Reflections on September*), is the founding Artistic & Executive Director of Art2Action, Inc. She is a writer, director, performer, and cultural organizer. Andrea has a Master's degree in Performance Studies and BFA in Acting, both from NYU. Awards include: 2021 Best Experimental Feature, Silk Road Film Awards Cannes; 2017 Freedom Plow Award for Poetry & Activism Finalist, *Split This Rock* Poetry Festival; 2010 Princess Grace Award for Directing. She is a co-founder of the MENA Theatre-Makers Alliance and CAATA, and a member of Alternate ROOTS and RAWI (Radius of Arab American Writers).



Victor Caccese is a founding member of the Brooklyn-based percussion quartet, Sandbox Percussion. As a member of Sandbox, Victor has performed over 150 concerts worldwide. In the Fall of 2021, along with Sandbox Percussion, Victor will give the world premiere of an evening-length work by Andy Akiho entitled *Seven Pillars*. Victor holds degrees from the Peabody Conservatory and the Yale School of Music. Victor serves on faculty at the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory as a percussion instructor and ensemble-in-residence with Sandbox Percussion. Victor endorses PearlAdams instruments, Vic Firth drumsticks, Remo drumheads, Zildjian Cymbals, and Black Swamp accessories.



N. Scott Johnson is an architect, artist, and musician whose work explores public space, performance, and memory. As a cellist and composer, Johnson collaborated with experimental filmmaker Barbara Hammer, performing his *Duet for Cello and Film* at the Berlin Film Festival in 2018. Subsequently, Johnson's work has been featured at the Wexner Center for the Arts in Columbus, Ohio, the Whitney Museum of American Art, and the Museum of Modern Art in New York City. He recently composed and performed music featured in the film 9/11's Unsettled Dust, which premiered on PBS on September 10, 2021.



Ash Marinaccio is a multidisciplinary documentarian working in theatre, film, and photography. She is dedicated to storytelling that highlights the socio-political issues defining our times with a particular investment in telling queer and working-class stories. For her work, Ash has: received a Lucille Lortel Visionary Award from the League of Professional Theatre Women, been listed as one of Culture Trip's "50 Women in Theatre You Should Know," received a Drama League Residency, been named a NY Public Humanities Fellow, and been a TED Speaker. Ash is a Ph.D. Candidate in Theatre and Performance at the CUNY Graduate Center where her research investigates documentary theatre, theatre in war/conflict zones, and precarity. Ash is the founding

artistic director of the United Nations recognized NGO Girl Be Heard, a founding director of the theatre collective Co-Op Theatre East, and creator of the digital documentary series Stage Left, which is currently being screened in film festivals across the United States.



James Scruggs is a writer, performer, and producer, who creates screenplays and large scale topical, theatrical, multimedia work focused on inequity and gender politics. His solo theater piece, <u>A Voluptuary Life</u>, received a MAP Grant. It explored the hetero-washing of LGBTQ+ history. It was presented at HERE Arts Center, 2019. In 2018, he created a site specific immersive, interactive, satirical work for *The High Line*, <u>MELT!</u> He was awarded a 2015 *MAP Grant* and a 2016 *Creative Capital Grant*, to create <u>3/Fifths</u>. Performed in May 2017, it was a fully immersive, interactive ethno-theme park, exploring race and racism called SupremacyLand. It got *"4 stars in Timeout NY"*. His 3/Fifths Trapped in a Traveling <u>Minstrel Show</u>, a piece about how in 2017 unarmed black men are often feared and legally killed. It was awarded an *Elliot Norton Award* for Outstanding Fringe Production, shown at BCA in Boston. Other grants include a 2016 New Jersey state grant *NJSCA Fellowship* for artistic excellence. Currently he's working with Rattlestick Theater to create a solo piece, <u>Dark Bravado</u>, which will be a trans-media piece about the virus of hatred and his intimate connection to 9/11. James Scruggs has a BFA in Film from School of Visual Arts.
